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#### **Mission Statement**

## **Curriculum Competencies Addressed**

The course addresses the curriculum competencies within the area of Discipleship and Ministry Leadership Division and promotes interpersonal relationship skills as well as enhancing one's ministerial aptitude to understand and relate to young adult culture for ministry effectiveness.

#### **Course Description**

A study and assessment are made of today's young adults with vital consideration given to the sociological, psychological, and spiritual factors contributing to their development and perspectives. Current issues of young adults and how the church should successfully minister to them aware of those issues are introduced, studied, and discussed towards relevant church ministry implications.

#### **Student Learning Outcomes**

Students will:

- identify and discuss relevant research on young adults.
- know biblical, historical, demographic, and developmental perspectives on young adults.
- understand current issues facing young adults and pertinent ways the church can work towards effective ministry to them.
- create and utilize a written assessment tool to survey young adults.
- synthesize research findings, textbook readings, biblical foundations, current issues into a practical young adult ministry for specific church ministry context.

## **Course Teaching Methodology**

This course will utilize lecture, group discussions and presentations, and an interactive discovery and creative learning format.

# **Course Requirements:**

#### Book Critiques - 10% (5% each)

Write a 4-page book critique on each of the textbooks for the course. Each critique needs to include a content summary of the book and a reflection summary. The content summary should be a two-page double-spaced summary of the book's primary content. The reflection summary needs is to two pages, single-spaced, providing direct quotes from the book in which you either state AGREEMENT, DISAGREEMENT, or MORE THOUGHT response and then a paragraph of why you agree, disagree, or need more thought. Provide the page number(s) of where the quote came from in the book. Critique needs to follow the NOBTS Style Guide with a title page, headings, font style and size.

#### Current Issues Paper – 20%

Write a 4 to 5-page paper on current issues facing young adults and influencing church ministry approaches for reaching, engaging, and ministering to young adults. Based upon the content of the course lectures, discussions, textbooks, and research choose <u>two</u> current issues that are impacting your church ministry context. Paper needs to include an introduction, two current issues, and a conclusion. The conclusion should suggest how ministry leaders and the church could respond to the issues. Follow the NOBTS Style Guide for formatting. **Due March 23.** 

## Biblical Pillars for Young Adult Ministry – 20%

Compose a 6-7-page paper on what you have come to believe and understand are essential pillars for effective Young Adult Ministry in a local church ministry context. The paper needs to include an introduction and conclusion sections. The body of the paper should present the biblical pillars. Follow the NOBTS Style Guide to format the paper. **Due April 13.** 

#### Young Adult Ministry Strategy Power Point & Presentation—20%

Create a power point of your proposal for young adult ministry for a local church ministry setting. You are creating this proposal to present to the church's leadership team. PPT slides

need to include: introductory slides—student's name, course number, etc.; slides to introduce church and its demographics—church & community; biblical basis for young adult ministry; current issues facing the young adults; a six-month strategy for discipling young adults, development of leaders for the ministry, weekly/monthly schedule of events, and special events for outreach, spiritual growth, developmental needs, etc. 16-20 slides are needed. **Due: April 27.** 

## Young Adult Ministry Survey Assessment Paper – 20%

During the semester, class members will create and employ a Young Adult Ministry Assessment to evaluate the perception and efficacy of the Young Adult Ministry in his/her congregation. From the results of the survey for your local context, compile a report of the findings in a 4 to 5-page paper. Refer to other coursework—class discussions, textbook readings, current issues and biblical pillars papers—that has been accomplished in the course to give objective feedback and substantial response. Follow the NOBTS Style Guide for formatting the paper. **Due: May 12.** 

## <u>Classroom Participation – 10%</u>

Participation is required for every course session due to the interactive learning format of the course. A positive attitude can only enhance the learning experience. The student is expected:

- To come to class with a constructive point of view, prepared to interact with the readings and resources on the course topic in discussion groups and classroom dialogues.
- To dress appropriately and in accordance with the NOBTS Student Handbook.
- To use cell phones and laptops appropriately.
