The curriculum competencies addressing in this course are: Biblical Exposition and Christian Theological Heritage.

Course Description

This course is designed to identify the needs for discipleship and mentoring of women today in order to build a more effective spiritual formation among women. This course is designed to discuss the importance of discipleship and mentoring, examine biblical foundations and models for mentoring and disciple making, and develop strategies for promoting and implementing mentoring and disciple making in the local church.

Student Learning Outcomes

At the conclusion of the semester, the student will:

- 1. Understand the biblical teachings about the roles of women in mentoring and discipleship in the church and home as discussed in class and taught in the Scripture.
- 2. Identify processes for mentoring and discipleship to be used in ministry as presented in the required textbook and the annotated bibliography.

- 3. Reflect on her past experience with mentoring and recognize patterns of discipleship in her life that she may not have originally considered mentoring or discipleship through the Reflection Paper and assigned study questions.
- 4. Recognize the needs of women and strategies for meeting those needs with various programs for ministry to women in her own church as reflected in a disciple-making and mentoring research project.

Course Teaching Methodology

The course will involve the following methodologies: video lecture, PowerPoint presentations, and interactive discovery-learning through threaded discussion. It will be taught as an online course lasting for eight weeks.

Course Requirements

- 1. Attend class. This course is divided into 8 one-week units. Each week's unit will typically consist of a slide show and video lecture. The student will provide a written statement of the percentage of completion of all in-class content items. This assignment is due March 13, 2020.
- 2. Participate in class discussion. Participation is determined by posts and responses in the Threaded Discussions held each week. These discussions will be related to the material covered in each week's content. All students are required to post a minimum of three responses in the main discussion each week: one in answer to the presenting questions, and two in response to classmates' postings. In order for the threaded discussion to be of maximum benefit to everyone involved, it is recommended that you stay as close to the course schedule as possible—so that everyone will participate in the discussion in the same week. Late postings will be penalized one point for each day late. Please limit discussions in this venue to the assigned topic. Students may e-mail or use the miscellaneous forum to discuss other topics with classmates. Please note the course will close on Blackboard on Friday, March 13 at 11:59pm.

- 3. Read the assigned textbooks and other reading assignments. Reading assignments will include readings from the textbook, Scripture, and other sources. The student will provide a written statement of completion of all reading assignments. This assignment is due March 13, 2020.
- 4. **Develop an annotated bibliography** of at least 10 works outside of the textbooks addressing discipleship and mentoring. Include the bibliographical information for each entry along with a 3-4 sentence description of the work. No more than half of the sources can be from the internet (and these should be academic or research-based). **This assignment is due March 13, 2020.**
- 5. Complete a Reflection Paper discussing your own discipleship and mentoring experiences. Devote half of the paper to your experiences receiving discipleship and mentoring, and half to your experiences discipling and mentoring others (or your plan to do so in the future). Reflection Papers should be 5-7 pages in length, double-spaced with Times New Romans size 12 font. This assignment is due March 27, 2020.
- 6. Research and develop a strategy for mentoring and discipleship in the context of the local church. Examine 3-4 strategies for discipleship and 3-4 strategies for mentoring. Analyze the purpose and format of each strategy, and use your findings to develop a strategy for your local church context. Dedicate half of this project report to research and half to your proposed strategy. Include information concerning the following:
 - a. Evaluate the strengths and weakensses of the strategies you research.
 - b. Analyze the unique needs of women in your church.
 - c. Develop a practical plan including leadership, logistics, and multiplication.

The project report should be 10-15 pages, typed double-spaced using Times New Roman size 12 font, following *A Manual for Writers of Term Papers, Thesis, and Dissertations 7th edition*. The manual is by Kate Turabian and is published by University of Chicago Press. **This assignment is due March 27, 2020.**
