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Mission Statement

The curriculum competencies addressing in this course are: Disciple Making, Servant Leadership, and Spiritual and Character Formation.

Course Description

This course is designed to develop strategies for designing and writing Bible studies for both personal and group use in order to increase knowledge and application of God's Word. Students will examine methodologies for studying and teaching the Bible to women through the local church.

Student Learning Outcomes

At the conclusion of the semester, the student will:

- 1. Understand how to study the Bible in a hermeneutically sound manner for both personal study and writing purposes.
- 2. Gain strategies for Bible study organization and leadership.
- 3. Value writing as an expansion of her ministry and produce quality Bible study and devotional material.

4. Explore areas of opportunity for writing, both in her church and in the publishing world.

Course Requirements

- 1. **Students will attend class**. Seminary policy states that a student may not miss any class due to the short length of the workshop.
- 2. **Participate in class discussion**. Students should contribute to the learning process through comments and questions.
- 3. **Read the assigned textbooks and other reading assignments**. Reading assignments will include readings from the textbook, Scripture, and other sources. The student will provide a written statement of completion of all reading assignments. **Due November 1, 2019.**
- 4. **Students will complete an article assignment**. The assignment will include defining a topic of interest to each individual student (and brainstorming the subject in class); developing an outline by which to write an article for consideration for the NOBTS Blog (or similar publication); and writing the article. The completed article must be 740-1200 words and include a query letter targeted to the editor of the NOBTS Blog. Use size 12, double-spaced, Times New Roman font. **Due November 1, 2019.**
- 5. **Conduct a Context Study.** Research the background of a biblical passage of your choice, including information about the author, recipients, the setting and surrounding culture, and the implications of such details on the interpretation of the passage. Context study papers should be 5-7 pages in length, typed using double-spaced Times New Roman size 12 font. **Due November 15, 2019.**

- 6. **Design and write a Bible study.** Develop a six-unit Bible study proposal devoted to one passage or topic, and write out all material for one unit of your choice. Include the following elements for each of your four units:
 - Unit Title
 - Learner's Guide Outline
 - Teacher's Guide Outline (discussion questions, commentary, resources, etc.)

For one unit of your choice, write the full Learner's Guide and Teacher's Guide. Examples will be provided during class.

The Bible study proposal should be typed-double spaced Times New Roman size 12 font, following *A Manual for Writers of Term Papers, Thesis, and Dissertations 7th edition*. The manual is by Kate Turabian and is published by University of Chicago Press. **Due November 15, 2019.**

All assignments should be emailed to Dr. Emily Dean at emilywdean@gmail.com, according to their specific due dates listed above.
